Board and CEO message

We are proud to acknowledge another fantastic year for our organisation thanks to the hard work and dedication of staff, survivors, volunteers, Board Directors, donors and supporters. We worked together in this challenging year to ensure the Jewish Holocaust Centre delivered quality Holocaust education to schools while continuing to support its major redevelopment project.

The pandemic impacted school visits, but when possible we delivered our engaging 'In Touch with Memory' program in person, all the while continuing to reach far and wide with our virtual workshops. We supported Holocaust survivors to virtually join classrooms, ensuring the opportunity for young people to engage in dialogue with survivors remained a feature of the program.

We commenced the pilot of our Teacher Professional Learning program, supported by the Department of Education and Training and the Gandel Foundation. Initial responses from the schools have been overwhelmingly positive.

Behind the scenes we worked with existing and emerging Holocaust museums across the country to form an alliance – the Australian Holocaust Museum Alliance. Together, we produced the first nation-wide virtual commemoration for International Holocaust Remembrance Day on January 27. Its success led to a second one produced for 2022.

Our eminent volunteer - Holocaust survivor Phillip Maisel OAM - announced his retirement at the age of 99. For more than 30 years, he guided a project collecting over 1,500 testimonies from survivors. We also signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the USC Shoah Foundation to partner with them on access, preservation and education based around our testimonies, thereby enhancing their reach.

We are so proud of our efforts throughout the pandemic to continue collecting and cataloguing artefacts, documents, artworks and books, as well as answering queries from the public, including many researchers. Our Organisational Support Team's output, despite mostly working remotely, has provided pivotal support to all our efforts.

Our greatest achievement of 2021 is, of course, the progress of the new building and we commend everyone working intensively on this. We recognise the efforts behind the scenes ensuring its success, including considerations of how best to engage with our diverse visitors. We acknowledge, also, the focus of the Curatorial and Collections & Research Teams developing new exhibition spaces.

By year's end the Board of Directors voted to initiate a name change to Melbourne Holocaust Museum, thus embarking on the exciting next chapter for the institution.



The Museum Redevelopment

It has been an intense year of designing and building every aspect of our new home. Our Project Control Group and senior staff worked with Kerstin Thompson Architects and McCorkell Constructions to take the project into its next stages. Notwithstanding the two-week construction industry shut down in September, there was minimal impact to our schedule - it is on track for handover in May 2022 ahead of six months of internal fit-out.

Early in the year architect Stephen Jolson finalised the design of the memorial space, drawing on his prior research and personal connection as a descendant of survivors, to create a deeply moving environment for visitors to reflect on the content of the exhibitions. The thoughtful design incorporates light coming in through the turret from the original building to dramatic effect, reforming a star of David.

Our capital campaign co-Chairs, Helen Mahemoff OAM and Phil Lewis, have continued their efforts stewarding donors and ensuring these special supporters are taken on the journey as key stakeholders in this important project.

It has been exciting to see the building unfold before our eyes, and watch the interiors gradually take shape. Kerstin Thompson designed the building as warm and inviting, and its interior wood panelling has achieved this. Additionally, the architects' emphasis on bringing light into this dark subject has allowed the integration of many features amplifying natural light with a combination of skylights and reflective surfaces.

Our Curatorial and Collections & Research Teams worked together throughout the year on many aspects of the new museum. They collaborated with exhibition design firm Thylacine to reach the developed design milestone by the year's end. This entailed all exhibition displays and text panels, alongside the placement of all multi-media content. Supported by a team of volunteers and staff, the multi-media content includes the voices of Melbourne survivors from our Testimony Project, aligning with our commitment to keep survivor voices alive.

We are excited to reveal it all in 2022.

Education



Throughout 2021, the Education Team rolled with the punches. Teaching with passion and enthusiasm, their success was evident in the large number of schools that engaged with our programs and then rebooked again.

Almost half of the 5,000 students we engaged with in the first half of the year visited us on-site for an object-handling workshop called In Touch With Memory. In this workshop, students engage critically with core aspects of the Holocaust with a view to understanding how it was humanly possible. With the aid of high-quality replicas of objects in our collection, we give students the opportunity to arrive at their own understanding of the significance of the artefacts and share their observations with the other groups. Watching students arrive at a deeper understanding of these events is inspiring, as is hearing the questions that they ask as they relate to the subject personally.

During the year, we were unable to have survivors join us on-site, so we provided an opportunity for students to meet with them virtually for a facilitated Q&A session. This provided students opportunity to ask questions of a living witness to the history following their workshop.

Lisa Phillips, who had been Head of Education for 7 years, decided to change her role to part-time Pedagogy Specialist in the middle of the year, focusing her activities on the Teacher Professional Learning program and education program design. We acknowledge Lisa's outstanding contribution to the museum and are grateful she is remaining an integral part of this excellent team.

Dr. Simon Holloway joined the team as Head of Education in October. His experience in the museum sector over the last six years, working at the Sydney Jewish Museum, meant he was already familiar with the various challenges of our educational setting, particularly the need to engage students online.

TEACHER PROFESSIONAL LEARNING PROGRAM

Our Education Team commenced a teacher professional learning program in 2021 in collaboration with the Department of Education and Training, and with support from Gandel Foundation, following the mandating of Holocaust education at year levels 9 and 10 in Victoria.

The innovative 8-step program extends our purpose beyond our walls by upskilling teachers' knowledge and pedagogy, as well as ensuring students receive quality, comprehensive Holocaust education directly from the classroom.

Teachers from Victorian government schools who have implemented learnings from the program already attest to its impact.

The teacher professional learning program aligns with our mission to imbue the knowledge, pedagogy, and confidence to teach the Holocaust in a meaningful, safe and engaging way.

ST ALBANS SECONDARY COLLEGE

St Albans Secondary College traditionally only offered history as an elective and had never attended our education program. To grow their experience in this subject matter, six teachers enrolled in our teacher professional learning to help with the transition to Holocaust education.

"It definitely has encouraged our teaching team to rethink how we teach the unit," said one St Albans teacher, "particularly about the message we want to teach the students."

BRUNSWICK SECONDARY COLLEGE

Brunswick Secondary College had long offered a Holocaust-focussed elective supported by a strong cohort of humanities teachers and longstanding relationship with JHC. When transitioning to a compulsory three-week Holocaust course they required additional support.

Their Head of Learning proposed our teacher professional learning program, which garnered an enthusiastic response from teachers and principal alike. Working toward a common goal, non-history teachers overcame challenges of a new and complex topic, while history teachers improved their pedagogy with new resources and approaches.

VIRTUAL WORKSHOP CASE STUDY

Virtual workshops emerged in early 2020 when, despite the pandemic's challenges, teaching the Holocaust and connecting students with survivors remained a priority. Virtual workshops have since become a permanent fixture given the technological ability to extend our reach and impact with schools which have barriers to accessing our physical site. Last year, St Phillips Christian College in Newcastle participated in a virtual workshop. Student Xanthe remembers it as "one of the highlights of Year 6" and created a video with reflections on her learning experience which won an award at the 2021 National History Challenge.

"At first, I never really considered the broader consequences caused by this historical event," said Xanthe. "Paul Grinwald left me one unforgettable message: we humans all belong to one race and should live at peace with one another."

The 10-year-old student also reached out to Paul via Survivor Connect. Read an extract of the letter below:

Dear Paul,

Learning about the Holocaust has taught me that we should never let racism happen again. We should always accept people for who they are. Ever since I heard some of the kind words you said, I have been trying to be more like you. Thank you so much for your intriguing talk. It was educational and heartfelt. It is such a ginormous privilege that we get to talk to such a special and knowledgeable person like you. We realise how hard it must have been for you to talk about your life journey and appreciate all the time and effort you have put into being with us.

VITAL FUNDING SUPPORT FOR IMPACT MEASUREMENT

During the year, we were pleased to receive financial support from the Helen Macpherson Smith Trust. This historic Charitable Trust was born from the legacy of Helen Macpherson Schutt (nee Smith) who died in 1951 leaving a bequest for Victorian Charitable purposes.

A grant of \$27,000 was awarded to us towards the development of a comprehensive Monitoring and Evaluation Framework to help us build robust organisational evaluation processes. As we grow and expand as a national leader in Holocaust education, it was timely to engage the services of Social Ventures Australia who led this project along with our key staff. An important component of the project was creating an organisational Theory of Change which identifies why and how we wish to make an impact in the community.

During the project, we sought input from key community stakeholders for their thoughts about our mission and services. We collected contributions from the Department of Education and Training, Multicultural Affairs, Perpetual, Gandel Foundation, school teachers, Board Directors and our own team members.

The establishment of a relationship with the Centre for Wellbeing Science at the University of Melbourne, an additional outcome from this project, supports further work in assessing outcomes arising from our programs.

As we implement the Monitoring and Evaluation Framework into our operations, we look forward to confidently reporting our impact as an organisation in the future. It will ensure we are collecting and analysing feedback appropriately, and continuously improving on our abilities to educate the public about the Holocaust, combat racism and foster understanding in the community.

JEWISH HOLOCAUST CENTRE FOUNDATION

The Jewish Holocaust Centre Foundation (JHCF) was established in 2003, as a stand-alone, independently managed entity with the aim of ensuring the future financial security and sustainability of the Jewish Holocaust Centre. It has been chaired and administered since inception by Helen Mahemoff OAM and has a Board of Trustees consisting of

Nina Bassat AM, Joey Borensztajn AM, Allen Brostek, Phil Lewis, Jeffrey Mahemoff AO and Helen Mahemoff OAM.

Successful in its endeavours since its inception, the JHCF plays a significant role in funding ongoing activities of our organisation. While building and growing a substantial endowment fund, the Foundation continues to distribute sizeable annual grants to the Centre amounting to more than \$6M to date.

The on-going focus of the Foundation grants are to support staffing and technological advancement. In particular this year, these have been directed toward the needs of the redevelopment project.

While concentrating its efforts on an established support base, new donors are continually sought, and the generosity of all donors is very much appreciated.

Collections & Research

Although the Collections & Research Team often worked from home, they achieved many successes. They continued to support internal and external enquiries and provided continued access to our Testimonies Collection. One highlight was signing a Memorandum of Understanding with the USC Shoah Foundation to explore access and preservation opportunities for our Testimonies Collection. The German Ambassador and other embassy personnel visited the Centre and spent time looking at collection items in February.

Our historical collections grew substantially. With many Victorians housebound, people spent time going through personal and family collections and offering us donations. It was a privilege to add many important Holocaust-related items to our archives, with many rare and interesting books also donated to our library. Understanding the importance of relocating these items into a public institution, as well as the publicity of our new building, has attracted new donors of items, as well as previous donors wanting to offer more. The Jewish Holocaust Centre Publishing House continued its work, with Halina Zylberman's memoir being finalized for publication and others continuing to be developed.

Loretta Joseph donated a treasured war-era diary written by her father, Joseph Marash. A particularly significant item that joined the our collection was the Czestochowa New Synagogue parochet (curtain), brought to Australia by Chaim and Bronka Fajgenblat who had survived Hasag slave labour camp. Their sons Mark and Len Fagenblat donated the rare antique parochet and it will be a key display in the new museum exhibition. Our team worked closely with the Grimwade Centre for Cultural Materials Conservation who are providing expert guidance on the preservation needs of the parochet and other special items in the collection.

The Collections & Research Team worked on two special events in 2021, both highlighting stories from the Collection – Michele Huppert's launch of her book 'Malou', telling her mother's story of her work in the French Resistance, and an interview with Holocaust survivor, Halina Strnad, recalling her experience as a witness at a recent perpetrator trial.


UNWAVERING SUPPORT FROM PHILLIP MAISEL OAM

Outstanding volunteer Phillip Maisel retired, at age 99, after over 30 years of incredible service to the community. Phillip's outstanding drive and perseverance resulted in our special collection of over 1,500 testimonies. Through that, he trained over 50 volunteers and inspired the next generation of professionals in this vital field of oral history and testimony. We thank Phillip for his invaluable contribution as a donor and a volunteer and for his unwavering dedication to the Centre.

INTERNATIONAL HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY




Museums across Australia joined forces to present a powerful commemorative event that bought Australian leaders, Holocaust survivors and human rights advocates into more than 5,000 homes.


